Dear Friends,

I know it is the beginning of a new year but I can't help mentioning Christmas. I was in Tesco about 4.45pm on Christmas Eve to see the decorations coming down. The message was that Christmas was past and that it was now new year as far as the shop was concerned. Slightly premature, I would have thought, but it just goes to show that the shops are in no way interested in Christmas itself but rather in what they can make out of it.

I am writing this letter on 28th December and maybe, as I do, we have that thought in our own minds that Christmas is now past and that all that remains is to get through the new year. But you know, it would be a great pity if we are thinking like that because it could mean that, like the shops, we have missed the whole point of Christmas and the heart of the message.

The gift that was given to us that first Christmas, that tiny Christ child, is not simply for Christmas but for life. That child who grew into the man who was crucified for our sins, He comes with us into the new year as the Saviour of the world, as our Saviour.

The angels announced that He had come, the Prince of Peace, the Saviour of the world. The shepherds took that message to all whom they met and told others all that they had seen and heard concerning the Christ child. MESSAGE FROM MARILYN SHEDDEN, MODERATOR OF ARGYLL PRESBYTERY

Dear Friends in Argyll congregations,

I am now half way through my year as Moderator of Argyll Presbytery and I am enjoying this privilege very much indeed.

It has been a great pleasure to visit and lead worship in some of the congregations which have been experiencing long vacancies. I look forward to continuing this at the beginning of next year. Presbytery is aware of the frustrations that can arise during such times and offers support and encouragement, and also gives thanks for the witness and life of our churches, so diligently continued by our members.

Many discussions are going on at national and local level to try to find a way forward that will provide ministry for all the people of God. Our own Presbytery will host two consultative meetings in January, one in Kintyre and one in Taynuilt. This will provide an opportunity for people to come together and discuss with members of Presbytery the problems and the opportunities that they are experiencing in vacancy.

One of my greatest joys has been to induct the new minister for Barra and South Uist and join in the lovely celebrations with the island folk.

In these past six months Chris Brett, our Presbytery Clerk, and I have been pursuing various initiatives to explore how the Church can become more involved in the community.

- At our Presbytery Conference we met with the new Chief Executive of Argyll and Bute, and we will continue discussions with him on matters in which we feel the church might be able to help.
- We are looking at ways that as a Presbytery, we might offer chaplaincy to Calmac.
- Chris and I have had the pleasure of meeting with Bishop Brian McGee (Roman Catholic Bishop of Argyll and the Isles) and Bishop Kevin Pearson (Episcopal Bishop of Argyll and the Isles). We were warmly received by both and we share much in common about the current situation in our churches. We hope to work together where we can, and perhaps plan a joint community initiative.

One of my main interests and concerns is for young people, and with the help of our Youth Ministry Team I wish to try to visit most of the senior schools in our Presbytery to have informal conversations with our young adults about life and faith.

At this wonderful time of Advent, we remember that we are a people of hope. We remember that we are on a journey of faith together and we are guided by the one who is The Light of the World. Despite the darkness that engulfs our world in these difficult times, we will go again to the manger and await the nativity of Hope. We will listen for the cry that will echo throughout eternity. It will be a cry for justice and peace. If we ignore it, we have missed the point of Christmas.

May the Christ child be born anew in us and the world at this Christmas time.

PASTORAL CARE OF PRESBYTERY STAFF

Argyll Presbytery offers support from pastoral carers for all its Ministers, Ordained Local Ministers, Auxiliary Ministers, Deacons, Presbytery and Parish Workers.

We are looking for more volunteer pastoral carers to help in this important work. It involves making contact with a defined number of people. The carers are available to respond as necessary at any time and make one face to face visit a year; they are a very important listening ear.

The pastoral carers form a supportive team and meet during the year.

HUB MINISTRY

Hub ministry - an idea being considered by the Church of Scotland. Congregations are getting smaller; less people are coming forward to train as Ministers: this means that our current position of having around 800 charges each with a Minister is no longer viable. The Church is planning for the number of charges to decline to 600.

The Church is hoping to create flourishing hubs of Ministry and is asking some Presbyteries to pilot this idea.


Here in Argyll Presbytery we have 32 charges and currently have 12 vacancies and the number of vacancies is going to increase as people retire. Acting as Interim Moderator can be a very demanding role for Ministers in addition to caring for their own Parish and it is taking a long time to fill vacancies.

What is it? - Presbyteries would be encouraged to group Parishes together, under the leadership of a Parish Minister. Churches would then have a shared Minister leading a team and lay people would be an important part of that team both in leading worship and in administration.

How would it affect congregations? - at the moment congregations make decisions about linking with other Churches and about calling Ministers, these can be lengthy, bureaucratic processes. The suggestion is that under a Hub System Ministers would be appointed by Presbytery with congregations involved but the legal processes involved in unions and linkages would not be used.

If this system were adopted it could free up some finance which could allow alternative types of Ministry such as Chaplains to industry, youth Ministry etc. to develop. The Report to the General Assembly says that moving to this Hub Ministry would require a huge effort in terms of preparation and training and cooperative efforts across the parishes and amongst the ministries. The rewards of engaging in this could be transformative for the life and ministry of the Church of Scotland.

Want to know more? - An open Presbytery meeting is to be held in Tarbert Village Hall on Tuesday 17th January, 7.00 - 9.00pm. Everyone is welcome.




