Dear Friends,

I held it back so that I had the opportunity to thank everyone who contributed towards the gift you gave me to mark the 25th Anniversary of my Ordination to ministry. You were incredibly generous in raising £815 and I look forward very much to getting my new robes which will definitely last me for the remainder of my ministry!

Twenty-five years is quite a milestone. It was humbling to look back over my ministry as Bert, Robert, Lindsay and Ian recounted their memories of my time working in Rothesay, Drumchapel, Yorkhill and the Queen Mother's and of course, Lochgilphead, respectively. To have photos flash up on the screen of sponsored walks, of the Children's Garden of Remembrance, of Church meals, of baptisms and weddings, of days out and holidays with friends, of family events and even of a friend's birthday party when I was three and a half was entertaining to say the least. 

These will take place on the last Sunday of August, November, February and May to help with essential ongoing maintenance of the church buildings.






MOVIE Nick and Carol Pollard from EthosMedia.org share thought-provoking

Communal heroism

Christopher Nolan, the writer and director of Dunkirk describes the true event on which it is based as 'one of the greatest stories in human history'. Brilliantly bucking the trend of recent war films he does not resort to gore and special effects, as he provides an immersive experience that enables the viewer to empathise with the young soldiers in their apparently hopeless situation, trapped between the sea and the advancing German army.

By cleverly moving around the timeline, we experience the different perspectives on land, sea and air. Particularly powerful is the interplay between two characters on one of the small boats heading to Dunkirk. Cillian Murphy plays a shell-shocked soldier picked up from a torpedoed ship, on the outward journey, and desperate not to be taken back towards the beach. Previously having starring roles in Nolan films (Inception,


The Dark Knight) here Murphy is credited only as 'Shivering



Nolan says: 'as a group of people we can achieve so much more than we can individually', an important message for all of us. At that crucial time in history, King George VI called the nation to pray. As we pray for our nation today, perhaps God will open our eyes to see how we can each use our limited skills and resources for the common good.



New members, both experienced and beginners are welcome to come along and join us.







Gabriel is best known for his appearing to a young Jewish girl named Mary to tell her that she will give birth to Jesus.

Can you find you way through these 2 fruit mazes?


